I. Proceedings

Chair Jay Price called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. and asked KSHS staff member Jamee to provide instructions on navigating the Webinar menu and participating in the meeting. Price asked for introductions from Board members and staff.

II. Roll Call

III. Review of Minutes for June 7, 2025 Meeting

Dr. Wynn made a motion to approve the minutes as prepared. Second: Kelly. Dr. McMurray and Dr. Murphey were not at the June meeting. 6 votes to approve. 2 abstentions.

IV. KSHS & Cultural Resources Division Director's Report

Patrick Zollner reported on the agency budget and the legislative process. Zollner announced that the Museum of History will officially open on November 22, after being closed for three years for remodeling, and that the Historical Society received a Save America's Treasures grant to work on the west building of the Shawnee Indian Mission historic site.

Katrina Ringler shared updates on the register of historic places. Applications for the Heritage Trust Fund are open and due at the beginning of November; Board members are asked to volunteer to serve on the committee. Ringler announced our new Subgrants Coordinator, Darbee Chard, and our new Archaeology Lab Director, Stephen Keener.

V. Consider Nominations for both the State & National Registers of Historic Places

1. Fifth Street Historic District – Leavenworth, Leavenworth Co.

Prepared by: Dale Nimz on behalf of the owners

Criteria C: Architecture

Period of Significance: c1860-1921

Presented by: Dale Nimz

Discussion: Kelly asked for clarification regarding the district choice versus individual listings. Fiore Krivenko said that, ultimately, it is up to the HSBR to decide whether the district's size is acceptable to list, as there is no recorded survey in the area. Dr. Wynn asked if more properties could be added to the district later. Nimz mentioned the conflict with preservation planning and the lack of a survey, but the owners are dedicated and fully supportive of listing. McDonald asked for a follow-up on Kelly's question and whether this classifies as a district.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical review. Substantive revisions were requested and received. The nomination appears complete. However, our office is not sure if the NPS will support such a small district in an established neighborhood and so close to other similar districts. The preparer added some more information regarding this comparison. The property is within the jurisdiction of Leavenworth CLG. The local preservation commission reviewed the nomination (8/6/25) and supported listing; their comments are included in the packet. The nomination is complete; staff does not have a recommendation, but isn't opposed to approving/forwarding the nomination.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the audience.

Motion 1: Schodorf moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Dr. Wynn. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Schodorf moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion C: Architecture. Second: Dr. Wynn. 8 votes to approve.

2. Battey House – Florence, Marion Co.

Criterion C: Architecture

Period of Significance: 1883

Presented by: Christy Davis

Discussion: Schodorf asked about the piers/stone fence around the property. Davis clarified. Dr. Price asked about the 1960s addition and if it was noncontributing. Fiore Krivenko explained the narrowed period of significance and how the addition was not substantial or significant in design. The building is also treated as a single building because it is an addition and not a separate building later connected.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical review. Substantive revisions were requested regarding the architectural context. Revisions were received, and the nomination appears complete. The property is not within the boundaries of a CLG. Staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the audience.

Motion 1: Dr. Wynn moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Schodorf. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Dr. Wynn moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion C: Architecture. Second: Schodorf. 8 votes to approve.

3. Verschelden Funeral Home – St. Marys, Pottawatomie Co.

Criterion A: Commerce

Period of Significance: 1914-1976

Presented by: Brenda Spencer

Discussion: Kelly asked about including Architecture as an area of significance. Spencer explained that after discussion with the staff, we settled on Commerce only. Fiore Krivenko explained that, since the function and form reflect the funeral home rather than the original residence, it would be best to pursue Commerce. She also discussed the nomination with NPS to get their opinion. Dr. Wynn recommends clarifying the discussion of Indigenous history and will offer language to revise the nomination. Dr. Murphey supports this recommendation.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical review. Substantive revisions were requested regarding the commercial significance of the property in relation to the first owner. Revisions were received, updating the nomination to focus on the funeral home's operations and their significance. The nomination appears complete. The property is not within the boundaries of a CLG. The funeral home context is supported in the narrative; staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: David Steele and Pam Sumner of St. Marys Historical Society spoke in support of the revisions and nomination.

Motion 1: Dr. Wynn moved that the Board approve this nomination with minor revisions for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Dr. Murphey. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Dr. Wynn moved that the Board recommend that the SHPO forward the revised nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion A: Commerce. Second: Dr. Murphey. 8 votes to approve.

4. Rex Arms – Manhattan, Riley Co.

Criteria A & C: Community Planning and Development, Architecture

Period of significance: 1925

Presented by: Lauren Davison

Discussion: Dr. Price liked including the social history and impact within Manhattan.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical review. Substantive clarifications were requested and received. The nomination appears complete. The property is within the Manhattan CLG boundaries. The CLG reviewed the nomination at its 8/25/25 meeting and provided SHPO with two minor clarifications. Those have been addressed. A letter of support from the property owner was submitted and is included in the packets. The property appears to meet the registration requirements of the *Late Nineteenth Century and Early Twentieth Century Residential Resources in Manhattan, Kansas, MPDF*; staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the audience.

Motion 1: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Kelly. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criteria A & C: Community Development and Planning, Architecture. Second: Kelly. 8 votes to approve.

5. Marjoy Apartments – Wichita, Sedgwick Co*

Criterion C: Architecture

Period of significance: 1960

Presented by: Mason Martel

Discussion: Schodorf asked about the condition of the building and if it is worth preserving. Martel explained that this is why the owners are pursuing listing: to preserve it. Schodorf has she was unclear how she would vote.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical and substantive review. The nomination appears to be complete. The property is within the Wichita CLG boundaries. The CLG reviewed the nomination 9/8/25. We have not yet received comments. Marjoy Apartments has an approved Part 1 with NPS. The property appears to meet the registration requirements of the *Residential Resources of Wichita, Sedgwick County, Kansas 1870-1957 MPDF*; staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the audience.

Motion 1: Kelly moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places as prepared. Second: Dr. Wynn. 7 votes to approve, 1 abstention.

Motion 2: Kelly moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register as prepared. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion C: Architecture. Second: Dr. Wynn. 7 votes to approve, abstention.

6. Minisa Bridge – Wichita, Sedgwick Co.*

Prepared by: Susie Cunningham

Criterion C: Art and Architecture

Period of significance: 1932

Presented by: Megan Maize, KS-SHPO Staff

Discussion: Dr. Price mentioned that the bridge is an icon of Wichita and that locals have put a lot of effort into restoring it. Dr. Wynn asked about the origins of the word “Minisa.” Susie Cunningham, a member of the Little Arkansas Community Coalition, answered, discussing her research into the word. Though newspapers and a plaque state that the word is Zuni, there is no documented evidence to support this claim. Dr. Price asked if the nomination could be revised to clarify that point. Schodorf asked about the fort and the nearby village. Kelly suggested removing the Zuni reference since there is no evidence to support it. Dr. Murphy expressed concern about the 1932 plaque and its language that suggests a false history/narrative. Dr. Murphy is not comfortable supporting a listing due to the plaque's inaccuracy. Dr. Price mentioned the style “Pueblo Deco” and how that might cause confusion with the Zuni reference. Dr. Price recommended some sources for review. Dr. Murphy requested that the THPO be included in the discussion. Dr. Wynn thinks the revisions are doable and trusts SHPO to address them. Schodorf and McDonald agree and are comfortable moving forward. Fiore Krivenko said she will contact the Board for their specific concerns and meet with the preparer.

SHPO Report: Substantive clarifications were requested and received. The property is within the boundaries of the Wichita CLG, which reviewed the nomination on 7/14/25 and supports the listing. Copies of their minutes and report are included in the packet. Staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: There were no additional comments or questions from the public.

Motion 1: Schodorf moved that the Board approve this nomination, with revisions discussed above, for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places as prepared. Second: Dr. Price. 7 votes to approve; 1 vote to deny.

Motion 2: Schodorf moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register with revisions. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion C: Art and Architecture. Second: Dr. Price. 7 votes to approve; 1 vote to deny.

7. Van Nice Monument Company – Topeka, Shawnee Co.*

Criterion A: Commerce

Period of significance: 1929-1960

Presented by: Jamee Fiore Krivenko, SHPO Staff

Discussion: Zollner discussed the previous Section 106 project from KDOT that evaluated the building years ago. Dr. Price asked which of the two versions the Board should vote on. Fiore Krivenko said that it is the Board's opinion, as it is unclear whether this is an appeal based on state regulations. Dr. Price said they will vote on the "HSBR version." Dr. Wynn asked whether the nomination is complete or whether it is missing evidence or documentation. Fiore Krivenko said that it is not complete, and documentation is missing. Fiore Krivenko clarified the difference between the nomination and why this was presented to the board.

SHPO Report: The nomination has not completed and did not pass the technical review. In April, the preparers submitted additional information, but more was still needed. The preparer requested that the nomination be scheduled for the HSBR meeting. Since then, SHPO staff have added notes from a 2014 survey (also provided to the preparer) to the nomination form. A copy of the submitted nomination and SHPO comments is in the packet. The nomination is within the boundaries of the Topeka CLG. The CLG has not provided comments but is aware of the nomination. Missing clarifications, documentation, context, and maps should be considered. Staff recommend denying the nomination for more information as the documentation is incomplete.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the audience.

Motion 1: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board disapprove this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. The property appears to be eligible; however, more information regarding its significance is required; areas of concern are noted above. Second: McDonald. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board recommend the SHPO not forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register. The property appears to be eligible; however, more documentation needs to be provided. Second: McDonald. 8 votes to approve.

8. Lane Street Church of God – Topeka, Shawnee Co.

Prepared by: Dawson Berglund, SHPO Intern

Criteria A & C: Ethnic Heritage: Black, Architecture.

Period of significance: 1925-1964

Presented by: Dawson Berglund

Discussion: Kelly asked why the neighborhood is called "Tennessee Town." Fiore Krivenko mentioned that the Exodusters came from Tennessee and settled here. Dr. Price asked Berglund if the congregation had any thoughts to share. Dr. Price recommends adding information about the role of the congregation during segregation discussions or Civil Rights in the area, but not required.

SHPO Report: Substantive revisions were requested and addressed by SHPO intern Dawson Berglund. The property is referenced explicitly in the *African American Resources of Topeka*, MPDF, as an excellent example

in Topeka. The nomination appears complete. The property is within the Topeka CLG boundaries. The CLG has not provided comments, but is aware of the nomination. Staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: Charita L. Warren, a member of Lane Chapel (now Christian Methodist Episcopal Church), mentioned that she shared the church history with SHPO, and it is on file there. The congregation is exploring potential uses for the neighborhood, such as day care, a grocery store, or other community benefits. Ty asked how Berglund became interested in this church and wanted to work on it. Berglund said he was going through the list of nominations at SHPO and immediately knew he wanted to work on this one.

Motion 1: Kelly moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places as prepared. Second: Dr. McMurray. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Kelly moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register as prepared. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criteria A & C: Ethnic Heritage: Black, Architecture. Second: McMurray. 8 votes to approve.

9. Brown/Blachly House – Kansas City, Wyandotte Co.

Criterion A: Community Planning and Development, Ethnic Heritage: Native American

Period of significance: 1857-1877

Presented by: Susan Jezak Ford

Discussion: Dr. Price asked about integrity and changes, such as stucco. Jezak Ford discussed the changes and how incredibly unique this building is, given that most of the original townsite of Quindaro is no longer extant. Zollner mentioned the few extant pre-territorial era properties are unique and good representations of that period in Kansas. Schodorf noted that it looks more modern than pre-territorial. Fiore Krivenko mentioned the recent National Historic Landmark listing of the original Quindaro Townsite and how this ties into that significance. SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical review. Substantive revisions were requested regarding the integrity statement and hierarchy of spaces; revisions were received. The nomination appears complete. The property is within the boundaries of Wyandotte County/Kansas City Unified Government CLG, and they have been notified. We have not received comments from the CLG. Staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: Freedom's Frontier National Heritage Area mentioned its support of the listing.

Motion 1: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places as prepared. Second: Kelly. 8 votes to approve.

Motion 2: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register as prepared. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion A: Community Planning and Development, and Ethnic Heritage: Native American. Second: Kelly. 8 votes to approve.

The Board took a 15-minute break at 12:12. The meeting resumed at 12:31.

VI. Consider Nominations for the National Register of Historic Places (only)

Schodorf left the meeting, but a quorum was retained.

1. Genn Hospital – Wamego, Pottawatomie Co.

Prepared by: Spencer Preservation

Criterion A: Health and Medicine

Period of significance: 1921-1926

Presented by: Kristen Johnston, KS-SHPO staff.

Discussion: Dr. Wynn commented positively regarding the rehabilitation project. Zollner said it was a good idea to list this first in the Register of Historic Kansas Places.

SHPO Report: The Board first saw the nomination at the 05/14/2022 meeting for consideration in the state register. SHPO recommended SR-only due to loss of interior integrity and some exterior changes. The HSBP approved of the nomination. The owners want to pursue National Register listing and a federal tax credit project. Staff recommended submitting an updated draft nomination and Part 1 to the NPS for review, allowing the NPS to weigh in on the integrity and provide SHPO comments. The National Park Service asked for clarification regarding the interior changes, and after being provided additional information (included in the packet), they approved the Part 1. The nomination is complete and addresses the NPS's concerns; staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the public.

Motion: Dr. Wynn moved that the Board recommend the SHPO forward this nomination to the Keeper for listing in the National Register as prepared. The property meets the eligibility requirements under Criterion A for Health and Medicine. Second: Dr. McMurray. 7 votes to approve.

VII. Consider Nomination for the Register of Historic Kansas Places (only)

1. Axman House / Mater Homeplace – Olmitz, Barton Co.

Prepared by Dawson Berglund, SHPO Intern, on behalf of the owner

Criterion C: Architecture

Period of significance: 1898-1916-1917

Presented by: Jamee Fiore-Krivenko, SHPO staff

Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the Board.

SHPO Report: The nomination needed technical and substantive revisions. Revisions and additional research were completed by SHPO intern Dawson Berglund. The nomination form is complete. The property is not within the boundaries of a CLG. The building is an interesting example of the architectural type under the *Post Rock Limestone Properties in Kansas* MPDF. Due to some alterations and additions, SHPO staff recommend supporting the nomination for the state register-only.

Public Discussion: There were no questions or comments from the public.

Motion: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Kelly. 7 votes to approve.

2. Trinity Episcopal Church– Lawrence, Douglas Co.

Prepared by: Dale Nimz on behalf of the owner.

Criterion C: Architecture

Period of significance: 1873-1969

Presented by: Dale Nimz

Discussion: Dr. Price recommends a source called “The First Hundred Years,” which is a history of the diocese in Kansas. Dr. Price asked why the building is recommended for only the state register. Fiore Krivenko explained that buildings are evaluated in their local context, and Lawrence has a good number of Gothic churches with more intact historic integrity. So, comparatively, the alterations to this property weigh against the National Register. Nimz explained that the Church would prefer to list in the state register only at this time due to concerns about listing, but may be interested in the future. Dr. Price asked whether the Diocese was included in the correspondence.

Public Discussion: Linda McCoy, a member of the church, clarified that they received permission from the Diocese before submitting the nomination.

Motion: Dr. Price moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Dr. Wynn. 7 votes to approve.

3. Moss, John L and Elizabeth, House – Overbrook, Douglas Co.

Prepared by: Dr. Rachel Brown, the owner

Criterion C: Architecture

Period of significance: 1868-1894

Presented by: Lauren Jones, KS-SHPO staff.

Discussion: There were no comments or questions from the Board.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed technical review. Minor substantive revisions were requested and received; the nomination appears complete. The property is within the Douglas County CLG (and the City of Lawrence). Both CLGs have been notified, and we have not received comments. The property is recommended for the state register only due to alterations, and, comparatively, other stone farmhouses in Douglas County retain more of their original features, design, and have fewer alterations to the site and setting. Staff recommend supporting the nomination.

Public Discussion: Owners Rachel Brown and Matthew Bristow spoke about the property's history and its value to the community. They also mentioned the unique things they have been finding throughout their rehabilitation. Dr. Wynn mentioned it was good to include the surrounding lands. Kelly mentioned the likelihood of finding burials during archaeological investigations.

Motion: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Kelly. 7 votes to approve.

4. Walker, John, House – Kansas City, Wyandotte Co.

Prepared by: Nakia Hope, Concerned Citizens for Old Quindaro

Criterion A: Ethnic Heritage: Black

Period of significance: 1910-1965

Presented by: Jamee Fiore-Krivenko, KS-SHPO staff

Discussion: Dr. Price asked about future plans and how this building might relate to the Brown/Blachly House. Dr. Wynn asked about making a historic district to capture these remaining places. Fiore Krivenko replied that the original townsite has been recognized as a National Historic Landmark, and there are so few remaining structures (two on the agenda) that there isn't enough integrity to support a district. Dr. McMurray asked is there was missing information in the nomination. Paul Wenske said he had additional research to share and more about Western University. Fiore Krivenko explained that SHPO can only review what is provided to us, and we are missing information.

SHPO Report: The nomination passed the technical review. In April, the preparers requested that the nomination be scheduled for the HSBR meeting without a substantive review. Since then, substantive revisions were requested and have not been received. After the notices began, SHPO received an email saying the owners decided to go in a different direction. SHPO asked for clarification regarding the listing and did not receive a response. The owners have been notified of the meeting and the processing of the nomination. The nomination is mostly complete, but missing documentation and maps should be considered. Staff have no recommendation for this nomination.

Public Discussion: Nakia Hope spoke in support and explained that the Concerned Citizens for Old Quindaro are hoping to make this into a museum to honor the community. Paul Wenske spoke in support of the nomination and added/clarified some of the research.

Motion: Dr. McMurray moved that the Board approve this nomination for listing in the Register of Historic Kansas Places. Second: Dr. Wynn. 7 votes to approve.

VIII. Yearly Election of Officers

Discussion: The Board members discussed the positions and determined they would like to continue with the current Chair and Vice-Chair.

Motion: Dr. Wynn moved to approve Dr. Price as Chair and Schodorf as Vice-Chair to the HSBR. Second: McDonald. 6 votes to approve.

The Board took a break at 1:37. The meeting resumed at 1:51.

IX. Work Session: Draft Regulations Discussion

Fiore Krivenko outlined the purpose and key points of the draft regulations. Currently, there are no state regulations for the Register of Historic Kansas Places. However, there are regulations for some of our other programs. A few SHPO staff presented other program regulations and how they may be affected by the Register of Historic Kansas Places regulations. Kristen Johnston spoke about the state rehabilitation tax credit regulations; Lauren Jones spoke about the Kansas Preservation Law; and Katrina Ringler spoke about the Heritage Trust Fund. The Board asked for real-world examples or projects that reflect some of the properties they saw at the meeting. Fiore Krivenko mentioned the need for Board review and comment. These regulations will directly affect how the Board makes decisions and evaluations for properties in Kansas. The process has many levels of review and comment from different parts of the legislature, but this is the first step. The Board asked for more time to review the nominations. Fiore Krivenko will send an updated draft for review.
